A meeting of the Board of Selectmen was held on Tuesday, June 21, 2016 at 6pm with five selectpersons, the Town Administrator and the Asst. Town Administrator.

Meeting Called to Order

Executive Session – Discuss Strategy for Contract Negotiations with Non-Union Personnel: Town Administrator and Strategy with Respect to Litigation: Selectperson Campbell moved that the Board of Selectmen enter into Executive Session under MGL Chapter 30A, §21(a) for exception #2 to discuss strategy for contract negotiations with non-union personnel (Town Administrator) and MGL Chapter 30A, §21(a) for exception #3 to discuss strategy with respect to litigation (Brown, POM, and Roma), Selectperson Wilkinson seconded, Roll Call Vote: Selectperson Battistelli – aye, Selectperson Campbell – aye, Selectperson Sheedy – aye, Selectperson Wilkinson – aye, Chairperson Murphy – aye, all in favor.

Chairman Murphy: “We are entering executive session because, by not doing so, it would be detrimental to the Town’s litigating position. The Board will reconvene in Open Session.”

7:00 Pledge of Allegiance and Moment of Silence

Public Comment Period: Chairman Murphy said he wanted to clarify that we are going to put the public comment period at the beginning of the meeting so those in attendance can comment on interviews that may be on the agenda. Selectperson Wilkinson said that was why it was decided to nominate candidates at one meeting and vote on the appointment two weeks later at the next meeting. Chairman Murphy read the participation rules, highlighting the following:

Public Comment Period

- Speakers can speak for 3 minutes.
- The chairperson may determine the length of the open session
- The chairperson may extend the time limit
- Preference will be given to those items that are on the agenda
- Improper conduct and remarks are not allowed
- Defamatory or abusive remarks are always out of order
- The chairperson may terminate an individual’s privilege to address the Board
- All remarks are addressed through the Chairperson

T. Arsenian, 95 Granite Street, commented on year-end transfers. He questioned what the Police Equipment Expenses are, he inquired if there were additional expenses relating to the high tech meters, and what has been done about the Gloucester capital sewer expenses. He said he spoke at the MBTA meeting about the monopoles, he said Alan MacMillan was quoted as saying it was alright with the Conservation Commission but they should alert the Historic Commission regarding the Babson Museum. He said those poles will totally destroy the setting of that building. Selectperson Battistelli said those poles are a separate issue from the power upgrade. She said she was at the Conservation Commission meeting

when it was stated that in part the poles were for WiFi but they were also for safety. The Town Administrator said she is drafting something for the Board members to consider. Selectperson Battistelli said she wants to follow up on this as well. T. Arsenian also inquired if open committee positions are publicly noticed and if so where are they posted. Selectperson Sheedy said anyone wanting to apply for a committee or commission position is free to apply; the listings are on the website. Selectperson Wilkinson said that's why we have the annual holiday party, to recruit committee members.

Demitra Lavrakas from The Gloucester Times said a land court decision on the Tool Company was discussed at the last meeting. She is wondering when an update will be on the agenda.

Z. Seppala, 92 Granite St., said he went to the By-Law Committee meeting last week and gave them a copy of part of the town charter. He said it prohibits town officials from being on other town committees. Town Counsel said it is alright for these individuals to be on other boards. It was stated that if they are on a committee as a member of their committee, it is alright. He inquired if there are records available of all town counsel opinions that residents can review. The Town Administrator said that they are ex-officio if they are on a committee because of their elected position.

Selectperson Battistelli abstained and left the room. It was stated that the Commission currently has two alternate openings. Selectperson Wilkinson questioned if CPC funds could be used for some historic projects, Ruth George said yes they can. P. Woodbury said they review approximately 50-60 applications each year, they work closely with the building inspector, and keep up with compliance issues; and education is a big part of the job.

The National Grid representative from 44 River Street, Beverly said this request is for the Feather and Wedge. She said DPW Director Parisi is fine with it. It should take days to complete.

T. Arsenian, 95 Granite St., said if the DPW Director is in agreement with it, he should be here or it should be in writing.

Charles Gladstone, co-owner of the Feather & Wedge, said he received the proposal from National Grid. May 30 is the projected date for power; 4-6 weeks will be necessary.

Kathy Milbury, My Place by the Sea, said they started Hump Day last year on Wednesdays from 5pm to 10pm. She said it brings more people to Rockport, and shop keepers say the music brings people up Bearskin Neck. She said she does understand the noise issue and she tries to respect neighbors. There is a lot going on in Gloucester with the new hotel and restaurants, they can't compete with that. She said the first Hump Day of the season is scheduled for tomorrow night and it goes through the 2nd week in Sept.

Selectperson Battistelli said we are trying to reach a balance with folks that live on the Neck and businesses on the Neck. She believes it's a lot to have the music through 10pm at night.

Chairman Murphy said it's the job of the Board of Selectmen to work through the balance.

Krystle Leveille, owner of the Bearskin Neck Inn, 64 Bearskin Neck, said they made a formal complaint last year. She said the music is detrimental to the neighborhood and their business on a weekly basis. She said they do not want to ban outdoor entertainment, but it's the proximity of the buildings. She said amplified noise after 9pm negatively impacts abutters; there should be a maximum sound level by-law for outdoor events. She said the allowed decibel level in Gloucester is 60, we should find a compromise and move forward, and it should not be past 9pm on weekdays.

K. Milbury said she questions the data provided by the owner of the Bearskin Neck Inn, she wants to know how many people have complained. She said there is no scientific measuring; there is no validity to the decibel measuring. She said they have a DJ and have spoken to him about the volume; they are not looking for conflict.

Dana Salow, 125 Main Street, said it's only 5 hours of music/week; he is in favor of it.

Steve Grier, 39 Jerden's Lane, works at My Place by the Sea, said not allowing this would be detrimental to the community, this would be taking away the five hours of real lively fun that Rockport has.

Elizabeth Murphy, Pleasant Street, said maybe a compromise would be to change the location of the speaker so it is heading out to the ocean so it wouldn't affect the neighbors so much.

T. Arsenian, 95 Granite St., said we need a comprehensive noise ordinance in town based on decibels. A license is a privilege, at meetings in the past it has been stated that street performer music is for those who choose to listen.

Robin Feldman, 14 Whale Cove, said she is in favor of it.

Chairman Murphy reminded those in attendance that the license can be revoked if there is a problem.

Daniel Hurley, 82 Thacher Road, said in Europe people are just going out to eat at 9pm.

Clare Taber, 5R Smith Street, is in favor of this. She said people go to Gloucester looking for something to do.

K. Milbury said the wedding season is loud and she has never felt an urge to complain; the Rockport Art Association plays music until midnight.

L. Graham, Cove Road, Bearskin Neck, said from 5 to 10pm is a reasonable balance, hopes the license is issued. How about a compromise and don't attach it to decibel levels.

Mike Tupper, 78 Squam Road, said he supports this; it adds life to the town.

Jack Porter, Meadow Road, said traffic is going out of town at night; he supports this.

Dave Rash, Squam Road, said he has no issue with this.

Nestel, 22 Broadway, Lantana House, thrilled that there is something on a Wednesday night for guests.

Vicky Burton, 73 Bearskin Neck, said the music is booming for 5 hours. She can't open windows, and she works at home. She said we said we need a compromise.

Robin Feldman said she hears noise from Whale Watch boats; and we all have to deal with this. There is noise in every town; it's only for 5 hours.

Christina Willcox, 24R King Street, questioned when has anyone else been able to get locals out on a weeknight.

Steve Graham, 5 Doyle Cove Road, said this is for such a small period of time over the course of a year. He cautions about determining what music is deemed appropriate or not and what is offensive. He is in favor of a decibel by-law. He said this license will expire at the end of the year so we're talking about 6-7 weeks here.

Tardif Dominique, 15 Granite Street, questioned why it needs to stop in September.

Pat Murphy from Gloucester; said she comes to Rockport to listen to the music.

David May, 40 Marmion Way, cautions on decibels, and said the music is the heartbeat of Rockport.

Krystle Leveille said she wants to emphasize they're not looking to shut it down, they just want it regulated.

Eric Leveille, Bearskin Neck Motor Lodge, said he didn't know about tomorrow night's kick-off, so they haven't let their guests know about it.

Shannon Murphy said she lives Gloucester and works at My Place by the Sea; she said Hump Day is a lot of fun.

K. Milbury stated that they are in a business district; there are other inns in the area that are situated where children wouldn't be as bothered. She said the Motor Lodge has more of a personal view than My Place by the Sea, they are not as motivated by economic factors. She said she believes the Motor Lodge should think of the town more.

Selectperson Battistelli said she believed that was an inappropriate comment.

Selectperson Sheedy said that hotel has been there for a long time and the restaurant hasn't had the entertainment license for that long time.

Selectperson Wilkinson said they have received complaints from local residents as well as those staying at the Motor Lodge.

Chairperson Murphy said we are trying to attract young families to move to Rockport and we need to consider what is best for the town. He supports this, but wants it to run smoothly, he said it can be revoked if it's a problem.

Selectperson Sheedy said she doesn't like to see the conflict between the businesses. She supports events like this but would like to see a compromise. She said maybe 9pm is the answer.

Selectperson Battistelli said she has observed that in the last hour the DJ is yelling into the microphone and the noise is escalating towards the end of the evening; she recommends a way to tone it down towards the end.

Chairperson Murphy said 10pm, in his opinion, is not outrageous.

Selectperson Wilkinson said we received no complaints until the music went beyond 9pm. Maybe we should compromise and let the license go until 9:30. She said it is the Board's responsibility to keep the residents happy down there.

Selectperson Wilkinson moved that the Board of Selectmen approve My Place by The Sea's application for an Entertainment license to allow outdoor music on premises, along with approval of vocal music, disc jockey, and dancing by patrons at 68 Bearskin Neck Wednesday evenings from 5 to 9:30 pm to expire on December 31, 2016, Selectperson Battistelli seconded, Vote: 4-0.

The Town Administrator said the parking meter expense is payment due to increased activity in credit cards, the sewer expense is \$51,293.62 old debt, she has asked that they amend the inter-municipal agreement that allows any more of the current sewer debt to be passed through the users of their system only, it won't go on the rates of town users. DPW Facility Project with the DPW Commissioners
▪ DPW Facility Project with DPW Commissioners: DPW Chairman Reed said they heard the vote from the voters and there are some funds remaining to go forward with the designer. It's not enough for the entire building but they can start looking at some issues and maybe lower the contingency funds. They want to hire a designer and get started on the project. There is \$60,000 to \$70,000 remaining, a selection committee and a negotiating committee also must be appointed. B. Reed said they'd like to bring it back before the taxpayers at next Spring Town Meeting. He said they may need to house the generator; this would be a new building away from barn. Also, new storm water regulations are coming and that could

increase the costs. The question remains whether we should build the barn to house all DPW administration staff. We have received proposals but we are waiting to form a committee; we are following procurement law here. Board of Selectmen Chairman Murphy said he recommends waiting for a few years before bringing it back before the voters. In addition to forming the two committees an OPM must be designated, DPW director Parisi said he would like to be the OPM. T. Arsenian, 95 Granite Street, recommended delaying the vote, he said we should keep in mind that in two years, the schools will be coming for an override.

Selectperson Wilkinson said every resident she has spoken to was in favor of a new barn but thought the cost was high.

- Community House Fee Changes with DPW Commissioners: Director Parisi discussed fees being low for this type of facility, the recommendation is to increase the charge to \$75.00 for Rockport residents and tighten up who actually rents the building to be sure they live in Rockport. They have received \$14,000 in fees for one year. It was suggested to leave the rest of the recommended fee changes in place.
